Welcome to our third edition of Research Matters, a trust-wide newsletter that celebrates our high calibre research achievements.

Clinical research gives us many reasons to be proud, particularly when we see how it makes a real difference to patients' lives.

A recent study led by the National Institute for Health and Care Research Patient Recruitment Centre: Newcastle (NIHR PRC), run by Newcastle Hospitals, has given hope to patients suffering from irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) with diarrhoea.

The study, called RELIEVE IBS-D, showed that significantly more people who received a gel (Enterosgel®) experienced less abdominal pain and diarrhoea compared to participants who received the placebo version. Find out how the team took a a truly patient-centred approach to share initial findings of the study with participants in the *Feature* section.

We're delighted to announce that we've appointed three senior clinical research leads who will support the delivery of high-quality research across the trust.

Dr Ashely Price, Dr Iain McCullagh and Professor Ruth Plummer will work with clinical colleagues at the RVI, Freeman, and Northern Centre for Cancer Care respectively, helping to promote research amongst colleagues, provide advice and support to clinicians who want to become involved in research, and identify opportunities for new studies.

These roles are a key part of embedding a research-positive culture at Newcastle Hospitals and supporting colleagues to become involved in research as outlined in our <u>clinical research strategy</u>.

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We made a strong commitment to improving patient and public involvement and engagement (PPIE) in our clinical research strategy which patients and the public helped to shape.

One way we can deliver on this commitment is to ensure research participants have the opportunity to share their experiences through the Participant in Research Experience Survey (PRES). This short, anonymous questionnaire developed by the National Institute of Health and Care Research helps us to identify what we're doing well and where we can drive improvements.

A great example of using PRES to improve patient experience comes from the NIHR PRC: Newcastle. The team responded to national PRES trends that indicated patients aren't always aware of how they will receive trial results or have the latest updates about the research. To overcome this, the team worked with study sponsor, Enteromed Ltd, to share provisional results of the RELIEVE IBS-D trial within one year of the study closing, and offered participants the opportunity to join a Q&A session with team. In another example, one of the our research matrons used real-time PRES feedback to make the check-in process for Covid-19 vaccine trial participants smoother. Read more about this <u>here</u>.

Our aim is for PRES to become 'business as usual' for teams delivering research across the trust. There is lots of work underway to help us achieve this, including a recently-formed working group to share best practice and help overcome potential challenges. In the near future, we hope to appoint a dedicated lead to focus on patient and public involvement and engagement.
