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Overactive Bladder

A common problem affecting 12% of the UK population

Both sexes affected but more common in women – more common in the elderly


Characterised by urgency, frequency and nocturia

Frequently accompanied by incontinence

Long term condition

Management rather than cure





Conservative Management

Lifestyle measures

Pelvic floor muscle optimisation

Bladder retraining techniques

+/- medication – known side effects and poor adherence

NICE Guidance 2019



Surgical Management

Botulinum toxin (Botox) injections into the smooth muscle of the bladder wall – aims to decrease contractility of detrusor

Usually requires repeat injections every 6 months

Major side effect – urinary retention and requirement for intermittent self-catheterisation

50% success rate

Sacral nerve neuro modulation (SNM)

Implanted nerve stimulator

Costly procedure

Lifelong follow up

50% success rate

Surgical intervention

Clam cystoplasty

Urinary diversion


Measures of last resort











Is there an alternative treatment?

A recent Cochrane Review on Acupuncture for OAB concluded it was as effective as medication with a lower side effect profile but further high quality trials are required to confirm this

Offered as an adjunct to physiotherapy treatment since 2014

Capacity within the service has reached its limit



Acupuncture Clinic



Quality Improvement initiative working with Newcastle Improvement Team and the Institute for Health Improvement

Planning started in June 2022 clinic was implemented in August 2022. Progress tracked using LifeQI software.

Project Aim

"The pelvic health physio team will increase availability of acupuncture appointments by 50% for OAB patients by the 1st October 2022 whilst maintaining patient centred care"



What did we do



Instigated a multi-bed weekly acupuncture clinic Monday evening 5-8pm

Up to 4 patients being treated at the same time

2 Physiotherapists

12 appointments per clinic

Measures:

Patient satisfaction survey

Pelvic Health NP appointment availability


% of clinic appointments filled




Patient satisfaction

How satisfied were you with your overall treatment?




How would you rate the follow parts of your visit?








Number days until next available NP appointment for whole PH Physiotherapy Team

Have we answered all the questions yet?

- Undertaking the study/act parts of our initial PDSA cycle appointment times/privacy issues to address
- Continue to seek patient feedback for people undergoing treatment trials
- 2nd PDSA cycles for the next 11 weeks continue to collect data from original measures
- Review data collection at the end of December 2022
- Further PDSA cycles may be required
- Aim to have addressed our questions by April 2023
